When Pam Ann flies into town, it's usually best to duck for cover.

The self-styled Australian "air bitch" mixes trolley dolly glamour with a sense of the outrageous and a wicked wit aimed at anyone in the audience who is deemed "economy", which is just about everyone.

Brisbane and Melbourne are feeling the afterburn of her last flying visit and she is now bound for the UK to arrive at the Glasgow International Comedy Festival

Pam, alter ego of the charming and straight-talking comedienne Caroline Reid. is not one to spare anyone's feelings but Glasgow is a gig and a city that is very close to her heart.

She said: "Listen to me right now. To me the Glaswegians are the heart and soul of comedy and, honestly, I don't beat around the bush, I tell it like it is.

"I have always said New Yorkers are right on your tail but Glaswegians are one of the best comedy audiences in the world because they love a good time - and they love a good drink.

"I hear them from my dressing room and, in my head, they are all like pit bull terriers on leads who want to go for a walk but they are not allowed.

"Then I come out and let them off the lead and they are all like, 'Raaar!'. I don't say that about everyone. Glasgow, I adore."

She will be flying to the UK, of course, but if she has her way it will be low-key and incognito, which is all for the benefit of her show. Fly.

She said: "I like to go under the radar. If I get recognised, fine. That makes my trip wonderful because everyone is so gorgeous and lovely to me but, if people don't recognise me, I find that better because I can gather material.

"Pretty much the whole of the first act is based on my trip out to Australia, so it will be different when I come to the UK.

"Everything will be topical and will go into an hour of fresh, brand new material that hasn't even been tried and tested.

The deadline to take part in the National Theatre of Scotland's The Great Yes, No, Don't Know, Five **Minute Theatre Show is** fast approaching.

A series of live scenes, songs, skits rants and dramas, it will allow anyone anywhere, to have their creative say or $the\,most\,important\,decision\,in\,the$ country's history in modern times.

Anyone can take part by writing, devising, directing, performing and producing a piece of theatre that is five minutes long.

There are no set skills requirements and no required qualifications, other than a good idea, dramatic flair and some bravery. However, the closing date for

submissions to the show is 5pm next Sunday, March 23.

The event's co-curator, David Greig, said: "The Great Yes, No. Don't Know, extraordinary celebration of the

democratic and creative spirit tha exists in Scotland.

"Over one tremendous day in June we will bring together hundreds of plays, sketches, songs, polemics and poems made by groups around the country, as well soliciting input from some of Scotland's best writing and performing talents.

"At this key moment in the nation's history it's a way for Scotland to speak to itself-not in formal political tones but in a relaxed, rambunctious, celebratory and personal way.

"And, crucially, it's a chance for everyone to contribute, not just a political or artistic elite.

"It's going to be a special event and whether you find your self listening to a song from Skye at four in the morning watching a show in a live hub, or enjoying a laugh in the comfort of vour own home with a dram beside you, it's bound to be full of very memorable moments.
